It may seem strange to find your rabbi sending you words of inspiration for the High Holydays in July, right as you are just beginning to settle into the restorative rhythm

of the summertime. However, it's actually not at all too early to be turning our minds and souls toward the arrival of the new Jewish year – particularly this year.

As you may already have noticed, Rosh Hashanah 5779 will begin on the evening of Sunday, September 9th. This means that the month of Elul – the final month of the Jewish year, which is to be devoted to spiritual preparation for the honest self-confrontation that the High Holydays demand – will start on the evening of Saturday, August 11th. The summer will barely have passed its halfway point by then, but the Jewish calendar will already be tugging at our spirits, urging us to ready ourselves for the growth we seek during the Days of Awe.

Of course, on the most basic level, it doesn't really matter whether the High Holydays arrive early or late on the Gregorian calendar. We still get the same amount of time to prepare for them, and a case might reasonably be made that we are better equipped to do so during the summer, when we are accustomed to carving out moments for self-renewal. Elul is our preparation time for Jewish self-renewal . . . twenty-nine days that, according to Rabbi Andrea Weiss, the new Provost of our Reform movement's Hebrew Union College – Jewish Institute of Religion, are intended to serve as "a bridge between summer and fall, between long sunny days and crisp afternoons full of color and wind . . . between who we are and what we want to be; between regret and repentance, guilt, and renewal; between the frustration of accepted patterns and the promise to change."

Here at LBT, your clergy team has been hard at work, crafting a variety of meaningful experiences designed to enrich your month of Elul. I want to highlight just a few of them here, in the hope that you might take advantage of these opportunities to make the last month of the Jewish year your bridge between who you are and what you want to be:

- **Submit your High Holydays ticket requests now ... and let the transformation begin.** You might think of requesting High Holydays tickets for yourself and your loved ones as a simple logistical matter... something perfunctory on your "to do" list that needs to be crossed off before Rosh Hashanah arrives. But making your temple plans for how you'll be spending the Days of Awe is actually much more than that – it reawakens you to the coming of those days... what they will sound and feel like... what they will elicit from you. Add the services to your calendar and plan the family meals now, and you will find yourself drawn to put the month of Elul to good, heartfelt use.
- **Join us for Shabbat Under the Stars on Friday nights.** Our LBT custom of praying outdoors during the summer is cherished by our entire community. So many of our congregants first experienced the soul of LBT during our summer outdoor worship. Call up a friend and say, "We're going... please come with us." Bring your picnic dinner to be enjoyed before services begin at 7:30pm (please note: our August 3rd service will start at 6:15pm with our Friday Night Lift Off Band, so picnic dinners can be enjoyed after we pray that evening). Our Shabbat Under the Stars services during the month of Elul will include special meditations for preparing for the new year, as well as the sounding of the shofar. Come celebrate Shabbat with your community, and allow us to guide you into the self-exploration that Elul can offer.
- **Read and consider the daily Elul Reflections you will be receiving by email from LBT.** For the first time this year, we will be sending you a very brief daily reflection about forgiveness throughout the month of Elul. These reflections will be written by fellow Leo Baeckers, and they will take you only one minute to read each day... but they will add inspiration and wisdom to your personal Elul process.
- **Participate in our Elul Meditation Retreat on Sunday, August 19th from 10 am – 4 pm.** (see page 7) Whether you have never attempted to meditate before or are an experienced meditator, our retreat will provide you with some valuable spiritual grounding and enrich your preparation for the High Holydays... join us for this new offering in the month of Elul. from our president - lloyd segan



Dearest Leo Baeck Temple Community Members, Summer has arrived and with it the lovely long days we so appreciate. Allowing ourselves the pleasure of time-honored traditions for family and friend gatherings over backyard BBQ grills tethered with a glass of wine and a bottle of beer – and yes, soft drinks and water too.

Indeed, we are blessed to celebrate our good fortune as hard working individuals, educated in good schools, living in safe neighborhoods, medically cared for by world class physicians in glistening state of the art facilities. Most of us earned every aspect of this privileged lifestyle. And for most – it began with a caring home life with loving parents. Despite the occasional sugary treats, we ate nutritiously, purchasing produce, meats, and other fresh, nourishing goodness from conveniently located, well-stocked supermarkets and local farmers. And although we don't have the most favorable public transportation today – in LA – most of us are able to find transportation through the use of privately owned/ leased vehicles, offering us great mobility, access, and opportunity for exploration and employment.

Assuming that our success has been achieved through diligence and integrity, these results are good. And furthermore, we should feel good about living a full and prosperous life. I do.

Alas, this all makes sense as the United States is one of the richest, most technologically advanced nations in history.

However, in his final piece as a columnist for the *New York Times*, Eduardo Porter offered up some staggering statistics that caused me to believe that we need to double-down on the responsibility we have – as privileged people – to help improve the lives of others who don't have anything close to what was described above.

What if I told you that despite our societal wealth, seventeen percent of Americans are poor – living on less than half the

nationwide median income. That's more than twice the number of poor people in France, Iceland, or the Netherlands.

And if those statistics are not sobering enough, how about this – life expectancy of newborns is shorter in the United States than it is in Australia, Austria, Belgium, Britain, Canada, Chile, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Iceland, Ireland, Israel, Italy, Japan, Luxembourg, the Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Portugal, Slovenia, South Korea, Spain, Sweden, and Switzerland.

In essence, our infant mortality rate is higher than that of every nation in the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development with the exceptions of Mexico, Chile, and Turkey. Babies from affluent white families don't make up these ranks of the population – in fact it is the non-white and poor that populate this group. Black males born in the United States today will likely live shorter lives than boys born in Mexico, China, and Turkey.

The very survival of our democracy is threatened further when those that survive this first wave of obstacles then have to cope with prosaic education, poor health care, a scarcity of supermarkets with nutritional food choices, and gentrified neighborhoods that make housing near transportation hubs unaffordable. This pushes people further and further away from job prospects, making it even more difficult to climb out of their disadvantaged circumstance.

However, the poor are not the only people who have suffered in our nation. Hardworking, white middle-class individuals and families are not getting their fair shake either. Tethered with changing labor markets, the elimination of stable jobs – the rising costs of affordable health insurance – or the threat of not being able to obtain health insurance (as challenges to the ACA continue), an opioid epidemic, and education that is not keeping up with the skill set needed for a 21st Century



- **Open the High Holydays season with Selichot on Saturday, September 1 at 8pm.** The High Holydays season officially begins with our annual Selichot program and service. We will begin with a special art workshop, facilitated by fellow LBT congregant and mixed media artist **Kathy Leader**, aimed at deepening our Elul work with creative expression. We will conclude with our brief and moving Selichot service, during which the melodies

and liturgy of the High Holydays season will first be sung and our Torah mantels will be changed to their holiday white. Your soul will be ready for Rosh Hashanah after sharing in our community’s experience of Selichot evening.

One of our earliest sages, Rabbi Yose ben Halaftha, once was asked what God has been doing ever since completing the creation of the world. economy – they represent yet another group that is feeling disenfranchised.

Couple these fundamental day-to-day survival issues with environmental pollutants (contaminated water in cities for example), climate induced destruction, gun crime, mental health, homelessness, affordable housing and hunger – these mounting issues seem daunting and insurmountable.

An appropriately probative question arises – what can I do to help stem the tide – to bring light to the darkness; how can we help to build a world filled with promise?

How is it possible to help people find a way forward when our nation is so divided by politics, anger, and general frustration that it seems impossible to reach a consensus with a system that does not seem to be working for anybody? It feels very broken.

The understandable response is to be apathetic ... to sit out the civic processes of voicing concern and engaging in change.

However, all of us, from 18 and up can actually become active participants in a transformation by voting in the November mid-term elections – and each and every election thereafter.

Oh yes, I have heard the excuses; my vote does not matter, the system is gamed-money, there is gerrymandering and voter suppression – to name a few of the reasons expressed.

While it is true that each of these could be a reason for not voting – in fact – it is the very reason why your vote does make a difference. Why your vote counts.

Whatever you don’t like about the system can be changed by your participation. Each and every one of these issues can be addressed through your vote.

Regardless of your political affiliation / social associations and / or preference for solutions – most of our LBT community does share one attribute - the audacious belief that exercising our individual right to vote can lead to meaningful accomplishments that make people’s lives better.

what is mindfulness? what is jewish spirituality?

For us, it began with an observation, followed by a surge of questions.

One Shabbat evening, we found ourselves focused on Rabbi Chasen and Rabbi Timoner. They stood upon the *bima*, eyes closed, chanting, and praying, and there was a palpable peace. We had just come through Friday night traffic to get to the temple, and were struggling to anchor ourselves into the service, finding that when we finally quieted our busy minds and running inner motors, the service was nearly over. How did our rabbis stand before us with such an inner calm, with such a beautiful presence? Hadn't they been in traffic, too? Hadn't they faced challenges throughout their days? But here they were, right in front of our eyes, showing us there could be stillness even if chaos, or a whirlwind of activity, had prevailed that very day.

So our journeys began seven years ago as we started searching for answers to how we, too, could be present, here, now, not only during services, but within our lives.

Since then, we've studied Jewish Spirituality with Rabbi Chasen, Rabbi Timoner, Rabbi Zimmerman, Cantor Kates, and now

Rabbi Ross. We've also entered into preparation for the High Holy Days through fearless work during the month of Elul, the month that occurs right before the commencement of the High Holy Days. We've been practicing meditation within our Jewish Spirituality Class, Contemplative Services, and on our own, sometimes finding it impossible to quiet our minds, finding at other times a serenity that reconnects us to the precious gifts of breath and life itself. Through this process, we are finding the inner peace we once saw reflected upon the faces of our clergy.

Many of us thought there was no place for meditation or yoga in our lives. Spirituality was an amorphous word that really had no meaning for us outside of praying in Temple. We have learned how to integrate all of this into our daily lives in so many different ways. We invite and encourage you to join us on the many different paths we at Leo Baeck Temple can travel to enhance our lives as Jews.


